Why Rural?


The future of rural places, people, and environments is critical to the province of Ontario. With 469 of the province's 577 municipalities considered rural, making up over 17% of the total population, ensuring the sustainable health and wellbeing of rural communities is securing Ontario's long-term prosperity. While there are several organizations dedicated to the creation and sharing of rural-based knowledge, that knowledge does not always reach rural actors in a timely and efficient fashion. Thus, new mechanisms must be created to guarantee that relevant, rural-focused knowledge is delivered to those who need it the most.



The Rural Futures Project

The University of Guelph is globally renowned for its commitment to forwarding research and knowledge to support rural communities. In collaboration with rural partners, "Rural Futures: Mobilizing Knowledge and Sustaining Partnerships" is enhancing knowledge mobilization at the University of Guelph and partners by creating a centralized platform to facilitate the spread of rural-based knowledge to the actors most in need of it.

This initiative facilitates rural knowledge sharing, ensuring experiences within the University of Guelph are mobilized to rural partners in local government, community-based organizations, charities/non-profits, Indigenous communities, all levels of government, businesses, and other researchers. The project intends to build partnerships with actors outside the University to facilitate future collaborations and strengthen local communities. This initiative is funded through the Ontario Agri-Food Innovation Alliance.



Rural Futures Website

Incorporating the advice of our rural partners and the findings from our associated research, the Rural Futures initiative created the Rural Futures web portal. The website presents readers with background information on the project, information on the research team, and contact information for future inquires.

We are in the process of constructing a database of rural-based researchers at the University of Guelph. This database will be used to highlight the academic achievements of researchers, notify stakeholders about upcoming and ongoing research projects, and provide a platform for future collaborations. We are currently collecting profiles. For anyone interested in submitting a profile to be showcased on the site, they can submit their information through the website's intake form.

#RuralGuelph Social Media

To promote rural research emerging from the University of Guelph, a unique hashtag was created for social media platforms - #RuralGuelph. The hashtag is included on messages about new rural research, recent publications, new resources, and upcoming events. #RuralGuelph is used on Facebook, Twitter/X, and LinkedIn posts.



Conference Presentations



The University of Guelph is home to some of Canada's largest contributions to rural people, environments, and places. The following section showcases an illustration of rural initiatives taking place among University and community partners.



Rural Review

On February 23rd, this year's copy of The *Rural Review: Ontario Rural Planning, Development, and Policy* was published.

The website, launched in 2017, presents research and publications focusing on issues relevant to rural planning, development, and policy topics. It also highlights each year's entries for the University of Guelph's Rural Symposium, including oral and poster presentations, as well as plain language summaries.



People's Archive of Rural Ontario

While crucial to the wellbeing of Ontario, stories of rural lives are rarely captured for the wider population. Launched in 2021, the People's Archive of Rural Ontario (PARO) is a living archive designed to showcase and preserve the diverse stories and lived experiences of rural Ontarians. These compelling short stories use a range of media and are freely accessible to all. PARO aligns itself with the needs of rural Ontarians and is overseen by a growing team with varied backgrounds ranging from academia to museum curation. PARO is also supported by several external partners, including the Rural Ontario Institute, Ontario Barn Preservation, and the Rural Diary Archive.

In 2023, PARO added new stories that represent the full array of rural life across the province of Ontario. These stories cover a wide range of topics, from Durham, Ontario's Symphony in the Park, to the experiences of the Black community and their links to farming in Chatham. Dairy at Guelph Podcast



Grand River Community Play Project

The Canadian Rural Center for Creativity launched the **Grand River Community Play Project** in 2022. This project, consisting of several interweaving artistic and storytelling initiatives, focuses on connecting the diverse network of rural communities and Indigenous peoples that live along the Grand River watershed. Supported by a team of creatives, including artists, technicians, and producers, the project is a collaboration of a wide range of partners, including various academic, professional, and Indigenous institutions.

The project continues to collect stories and projects, including photography, performance through quilting, and documentary film making, with it culminating into a full production in August 2024. The community play is a collaborative method of creative storytelling practiced all over the world. As a community-led production, the final product will be a culmination of the various meetings and workshops, creating a unique theatrical experience that will reflect the diverse nature of those who call the Grand River watershed home.
